E-book rankings reflect sales from leading online vendors of e-books in a variety of popular e-reader formats. E-book sales are tracked for fiction and general nonfiction titles. E-book sales for advice & how-to books, children's books and graphic books will be tracked at a future date. Titles are included regardless of whether they are published in both print and electronic formats or just one format. E-books available exclusively from a single vendor will be tracked at a future date. The universe of print book dealers is well established, and sales of print titles are statistically weighted to represent all outlets nationwide. The universe of e-book publishers and vendors is rapidly emerging, and until the industry is settled sales of e-books works, calorie counters, shopping guides, comics, crossword puzzles and self-published books. The appearance of a ranked title reflects the fact that sales data from reporting vendors of all ranked titles conformed in timely fashion to The New York Times Best Seller Lists requirement to allow for independent corroboration of sales for that week. Publisher s and vendors of rales and e-books are lessed under the corporate publishing name instead of by publisher's division. Weekly sales of both print books and e-books are reported confidentially to The New York Times. The Best Seller Lists are prepared by the News Surveys and Election Analysis Department of The New York Times. Royalty Share, a firm that provides accounting services to publishers, is assisting The Times in its corroboration of e-book sales. ABSOLUTE MONARCHS: A History of the Papacy, by John Julius Norwich. (Random House, \$30.) Norwich, a writer of popular histories, finds that the truly great popes were outnumbered by the corrupt, the inept, the venal, the lecherous and the mediocre.

CLARENCE DARROW: American Iconoclast, by Andrew E. Kersten. (Hill & Wang, \$30.) America's greatest trial lawyer defended a roster of notorious clients; Kersten stresses his political idealism.

CLARENCE DARROW: Attorney for the Danned, by John A. Farrell. (Doubleday, \$32.50.) In this biography, Darrow's unsavory side is on view, from his personal callousness to his purchasing of testimony. **JOAN MITCHELL:** *Lady Painter: A Life, by Patricia Albers. (Knopf, \$40.)* Albers has written an incisive account of the life and art of Mitchell (1925-92), uncovering allusions to places, people and experiences woven deep in her Abstract Expressionist canvases.

LEE KRASNER: A Biography, by Gail Levin. (Morrow/HarperCollins, \$30.) Krasner's work reflected a profound grasp of modern art, but her marriage to Jackson Pollock was the central fact of her life.

WHEN THE WORLD SPOKE FRENCH, by Marc Fumaroli. Translated by Richard Howard. (New York Review, paper, \$18.95.) The "when" was the 18th century: French as the language of Enlightenment. **TYRANT MEMORY,** by Horacio Castellanos Moya. Translated by Katherine Silver. (New Directions, paper, \$15.95.) Through one family's ordeal, this Salvadoran novel depicts a country in a despot's grip.

THE CRIMEAN WAR: A History, by Orlando Figes. (*Metropolitan/Holt*, \$35.) The anti-Western Islamic reaction to the war continues to this day, Figes argues.

STONE ARABIA, by Dana Spiotta. (Scribner, \$24.) Spiotta's faded heroine struggles with the loss of her brother, an unrecognized rock star.

NINE LIVES: In Search of the Sacred in

Modern India, by William Dalrymple. (Vintage Departures, \$16.) Dalrymple explores the stupefyingly diverse religious world of the subcontinent through interviews with nine remarkable individuals, including a Jain nun ritually starving herself to death; a mystic who inhabits a cremation ground, drinking from skulls; and a sculptor of Hindu idols who believes he is creating live deities.

THE NOBODIES ALBUM, by Carolyn Parkhurst. (Anchor, \$15.) After her son becomes the prime suspect in a murder, Octavia Frost, the protagonist of Parkhurst's third novel and herself a best-selling author, tries to solve her own life by rewriting the endings to each of her seven previous novels.

MORE MONEY THAN GOD: Hedge Funds and the Making of a New Elite, by Sebastian Mallaby. (Council on Foreign Relations/Penguin, \$17.) Mallaby's smart history of the hedge fund business explains how finance's richest moguls made their fortunes and argues that the oddballs of the hedge fund world are Wall Street's future, and possibly its salvation. BROKE, USA: From Pawnshops to Poverty, Inc. — How the Working Poor Became Big Business, by Gary Rivlin. (Harper/ HarperCollins, \$15.99.) This blistering examination of the subprime economy is full of stories of the credit-hungry working poor and the booming consumer finance industry that caters to them.

THE SAME RIVER TWICE, by Ted Mooney. (Vintage Contemporaries, \$15.95.) In this nuanced thriller, a deal to acquire Soviet-era artifacts puts a Parisian clothing designer and her American husband, an art-film auteur, in peril.

REVOLUTIONARIES: A New History of the Invention of America, by Jack Rakove. (Mariner/ Houghton Mifflin, \$16.95.) An adept study that's part collective biography, part narrative history, "Revolutionaries" assesses the factors that led the founders to reject British sovereignty and create a new nation.

HOW TO LIVE SAFELY IN A SCIENCE FICTION-AL UNIVERSE, by Charles Yu. (Vintage Contemporaries, \$14.95.) In Minor Universe 31, the "slightly damaged" world of Yu's first novel, people use time machines to try to change the past. Yu's protagonist is a lonely time travel technician also named Charles Yu; when he isn't saving people from themselves, he's searching for his father, who invented time travel and then vanished. Our reviewer, Ander Monson, called this "a complex, brainy, genrehopping joyride of a story."

STEINBRENNER: The Last Lion of Baseball, *by Bill Madden.* (*It Books*, *\$16.99.*) Madden, a longtime baseball writer for The Daily News in New York who covered the Yankees and George Steinbrenner (1930-2010) at the height of his power, paints a vivid portrait of Steinbrenner's tumultuous reign: from the battles with Billy Martin and Reggie Jackson to the seven World Series titles won on his watch.

WORK SONG, *by Ivan Doig. (Riverhead, \$15.)* It's 1919 in Butte, Mont., and Morrie Morgan, the itinerant teacher and charmer of Doig's 2006 novel, "The Whistling Season," steps off the train and into a fiery dispute between a copper mining company and its beleaguered workers.
